ECONOMETRICS 120C

Course Description:

This course completes the 120 sequence. It builds directly on the previous courses deepening the students understanding of statistics and regression theory through extending these procedures. Emphasis is placed on understanding and interpreting statistical procedures. By the end of the course students are expected to have a strong understanding of the foundations of empirical work as it is employed in economics and many other fields.
