#### Important Administrative Rules.

- A. <u>Use your "number</u>". Starting on October 8<sup>th</sup>, you will be given a "number" to identify your attendance and exams for grade recording purposes. "**Numbers**" **are <u>not PIDs</u>.** Numbering is sequential and in alphabetical order if your last name begins with the letters A through J or K, then your number will likely be something between 1 100. No one will have a number greater than 300.
  - **Find your Number** by looking for the last 4 digits of your PID. If you cannot find your number on the *Scores Sheet*, ask a Teaching Assistant. Numbers are required on all assignments. No number, no score, no exceptions.
- B. <u>Check your scores</u>. Notify the T.A.'s or the professor of recording errors and follow-up until corrections are recorded. All documents will be destroyed two-weeks after initially recorded, so **there will be no revisions to recorded scores after two weeks from initial recording.**
