Transnationalism and Borderlands

In this course we will focus on the historical, material, and cultural significance of different borderlands. We begin with key concepts in borderland studies across different interdisciplinary formations before turning to individual and comparative case studies. While we will consider borders and borderlands from multiple disciplinary and interdisciplinary perspectives, we will focus in particular on relationships between culture and power and especially on film and other forms of visual culture.

Assignments

- -- A final paper, 12-15 pages, on a topic of your choosing, devised in consultation with the instructor. The paper is **due on December 10** and can be emailed as an attachment.

Presentations should do two things. First, they can make connections between assigned readings and additional readings suggested on the syllabus. Second, presentations should connect course readings to the analysis of a particular cultural text such as a film, music, literature, or art. I can make suggestions of relevant cultural texts but presenters are free to choose their own. On the day of the presentation, presenters should distribute a 1-2 page document summarizing the main points.

You should shortly receive an email invitation to the board. In addition to pinning a link, use the description box to explain the significance of the pin.
