COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will examine contemporary global indigenous thought, with a strong focus on the critical edge of Native American and First Nation Studies. These works resist assimilation and settler domination and motion to the importance of the indigenous thought in contemporary society. Throughout the quarter, we will focus on works, scholarly and artistic, that boldly affirm the presence of indigenous culture, thought, and leadership.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Through this course, students will be able to:

- Articulate the contributions of contemporary indigenous thought
- Gain a sense of the contemporary dynamics of settler colonialism
- Think deeper about the (re)structuring of society
- Obtain and develop constructive dialogue and consultation skills
