Online for summer quarter 2022

I will be posting pre-recorded lectures for each class. As someone who practices a "student-centered" classroom, I believe that the activities we run during a normal class are a valuable part of the educational experience of our students. To that end, while you are watching lectures online, I urge you to engage in the class activities meaningfully. That is: when questions are posed, you should try to pause the video and answer them before moving on to the answers.

Pre-lecture quizzes: Twice each week, I will assign some reading from your textbook and there will be a quiz that goes along with the pre-reading. Both the assigned reading and quiz will be located in the "pre-lecture" module for that particular week on our Canvas site. Quizzes will be due on Monday and Wednesday nights (at 11:59 pm). You can take each quiz twice, and I will record the higher of the two

grades. I will also drop the lowest quiz score of the quarter. There will be no quiz due Wed of Week 5 (ie: before our final class).

Midterm exams: there will be two midterm exams on Thursday of weeks 2 and 4. I will post both Word and PDF versions of the exams on our canvas page at 9:30 am PST and students will submit a completed PDF version to Gradescope by 11:00 am PST. Students can complete either the Word or PDF version of the exam, totally up to you. But the final submitted exam must be a pdf. Students can access Gradescope via our canvas page or directly via gradescope.com. It is important that students assign page numbers to each question on their submission, or the IAs may not be able to grade the exams.

Please be warned: internet weirdness often manifests itself when trying to upload important documents. The exam is meant to take 60 minutes, but I am giving you an extra 30 minutes to successfully upload your exams. Please don't take 85 minutes to complete the exams and then submit your exam late because the internet was being shady. If this happens, you'll be penalized. The penalty for a late submission is a percentage commensurate with the amount of additional time received. For example, if the submission is 9 minutes late, that's 10% more time than other students had. So the exam will be docked 10%. So please complete the exam by 60 minutes. That way you can figure out an alternative if your internet goes ka-blooey.

Oh, and the exams are open-book.

Accommodations for exams: If the final exam is higher than one (or both!) of the midterm exams, then we'll toss the midterm exam score and make the final worth the weight of the exams for which it has greater value. For example, if the final exam score is higher than midterm 1 but not midterm 2, the final will be worth 65% of the final grade and midterm 2 worth 30%, while midterm 1 will be worth zero. If the final is higher than both midterms, then the final is worth 95% of the year and both midterms worth zero. So, if you do poorly on one of the midterms - don't worry about it! It's a learning experience and you'll do better on the final. Both midterms better than the final? Then the weight above applies.

The other functional consequence of this is that you can miss either (or both) midterm without any explanation or reason. You don't need to contact Jim, you don't need to provide medical documentation. The zero score will be lower than your final exam score, so it will just be tossed.

One thing: IF you miss the final exam for a good reason (ie: an emergency) you are only eligible for a grade of "incomplete" if you have a passing grade. If you have two zeroes on your midterms, you don't have a passing grade. Soooo, yeah. Think long and hard about whether you choose to not-take a midterm. This has happened in the past, and is super sad.

I do not have make-up exams of any kind for any reason.

Syllabus quiz: the quiz is designed to make sure that folks familiarize themselves with the syllabus and understand the course's policies. Students can it an unlimited number of times and have until 9:30 am on Thursday July 7 to complete it.

Discussion Sections: are voluntary and also remote. They will be offered during the times provided by the Registrar. You can attend any section you like. During section, our super awesome IAs will be going over old exam questions with you all, so you'll get a chance to practice answering real exam questions. The IAs will also do other fun activities with you, so be sure to attend, be sure to be active and be sure to have your videos on. Sections will **begin Wednesday of week 1**.
