HIEA 135: HISTORY OF THOUGHT AND RELIGION IN CHINA: BUDDHISM

Second Summer Session, 2006

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Introduction

This course introduces students to the history of Buddhism in China. We will look first at the origins of Buddhism in India, then examine the intellectual and religious context in China j before Buddhism comes along the silk road. Next we will cover the arrival of Buddhism in China, its initial reception there, the growth and domestication of Buddhism, its maturity and acceptance, and its situation during late imperial times. We will also investigate Buddhism in China today. We will cover a period of time from roughly 500 BCE, when Buddhism begins in India, up to the present. We will study Buddhism not only as a set of doctrines and practices, but also as a human institution. We will investigate Buddhist beliefs and practices in their social and historical contexts. Our approach will be interdisciplinary: that is, we will use material from many different academic disciplines in order to examine Buddhism in China as thoroughly as we can. Disciplines include history, archaeology, religious studies, philology, literary history, anthropology, sociology, and critical gender studies. We will be reading both primary and secondary sources, and viewing art and film as well as texts.

Requirements

There are no prerequisites. Each student is required to come to class with the reading for that day finished, to participate in discussions, and to complete all the required assignments. The first assignment is to bring something connected to Buddhism in China to share with the class (10% of your grade). There will be a midterm (30%), a book review or site-visit report due during the last week of classes (30%), and a final exam (30%). You will need to clear your book or site with me by the end of the third week, The midterm will be a one hour in-class exam and will consist of essays and identifications. The final exam will be a take-home exam, and will consist of essays covering material from after the midterm.
