Economics 87: Freshman Seminar: Economics of the Internet

Syllabus

This freshman seminar looks at some economic issues surrounding the Internet. We will discuss such topics as network externalities, decreasing cost industries, the Microsoft anti-trust case and monopoly regulation, intellectual property rights and piracy of digital media, and alternative business models based on the internet.

All freshman seminars are graded on a Pass/Not Pass basis. To receive a Passing grade you must (a) come to all four class meetings unless otherwise excused ahead of time, (b) participate in class discussion, which means you should acquaint yourself with some of the reading suggested, and (c) complete a five (5) page project described below, including a presentation of your paper at the final meeting.
