Economics 165 Middle East Economics

The course aims /to introduce students to a number of economic topics relevant to an understanding of current events in the Middle East. It provides some practice in applying concepts from other classes to current events.

Unfortunately, there is no textbook which meets the needs of a modern course. Readings are an integral part of the course and will be accessible via the web.

Evaluation: There will be a ten page written assignment. Students will have the option of carrying out the assignment in pairs. A midterm is optional and will be included in evaluation only if it raises the grade. The final exam is compulsory. The final grade will be calculated as the maximum of a) the average grade of assignment, midterm and final, or b) the average grade of assignment and final.
