Synopsis_Scientific knowledge has transformed life in the twentieth century from birth to death. Nowhere is this more so than in the interpretation of Darwin's theory of the origin of species through natural selection. In this class, we will study the work of Charles Darwin, and a set of scientific, technological and cultural developments that may be called "The Darwinian legacy": evolutionary theory; genetics, eugenics, and racial hygiene; biology and birth control; environmental science and chemical pesticides; prenatal diagnostics and biotechnology. In each of these domains, we will consider how scientific understandings have been culturally interpreted and ramified through complex aspects of human life. How has the Darwinian Legacy affected the way we think about who we are and might be? How has it affected our view of our selves in relation to the natural environment? How has it framed the way we approach our most intimate decisions_about sex_and death?

- IV. Reproduction Revisited: From fertility to infertility and "perfect" babies Margaret Sanger thought effective contraception would free women to live life as they chose, but technology sometimes complicates rather than clarifies choice. Is there a "right to reproduce"? Is it ethical to abort a fetus with an undesirable genetic characteristic, or to use stem cells to create perfect children? Are pre-natal diagnostic technologies re-introducing the weeding out of "defectives" under the rubric of freedom and choice? Is this once again old wine in new bottles?
