#### SURVEY OF ISLAMIC CIVILIZATION

# **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to Islamic civilization. It surveys Islamic history between the time of the Prophet Muhammad, and the modern era. As we consider Islamic civilization, we will consider its presumed opposite, Western civilization, and ask what purpose such oppositions and categories of analysis serve. In short, we will examine not only the topic of Islam within the category of world civilizations, but the meaning of the category of civilization itself.

The class will incorporate lectures, readings, audio-visual materials, and discussions on Islamic history and society, law, science and philosophy, arts and letters, and architecture, to present a broad picture of the dynamics and achievements of Islamic societies. Throughout the course we will explore themes such as the historical place(s) of women in the Islamic tradition, recent Islamic revival movements, and the growth of Islam in the United States.
