ARTICLE REVIEW

You are to review a scholarly (as opposed to magazine or newspaper) article on some subject related to political economy.

- Article must be in a SCHOLARLY journal.
- Article must be on a subject related to THIS COURSE.
- You each do a SEPARATE ARTICLE (two students may not review the same one)
- Your choice MUST BE APPROVED BY EMILY TANG.

Where do you start?

- 1. Go to the main library or online and find a recent volume (since 1990) of one of the journals listed on page 4 of this syllabus. Skim the table of contents looking for something on a subject both related to this course and of interest to you.
- 2. Read the article's abstract, introduction and conclusion or summary. Then reread the whole thing. If you can't follow the technical details, see Emily (with a copy of the article in hand) or choose another article.
- 3. Choose a couple of articles and take the title, author, journal name, date of publication, and subject area to Emily for approval. Once she approves an article, you may begin writing your review.

How do you write a Review?

- 1. Use no cover sheet or binder of any kind. At the top of the first page:
 - Your Name and Student ID
 - Ec 155 Article Review (Spring 2007)
 - Author name(s) -- last name first
 - "Article Title" (in quotation marks)
 - Journal Name, date of publication, article page numbers
- 2. Summarize the issue or question(s) being dealt with. Relate your summary to other subject material studied in this course.
- 3. Describe the authors' mode of analysis. What data were used (if any), and from what sources? What type of mathematical modeling was employed (if any)? What statistical techniques (descriptive, correlation, regression, nonparametric) were used? Avoid diagrams if possible.
- 4. What conclusions were reached?
- 5. What flaws in the analysis or conclusions do you feel were apparent? Cite evidence of the authors' political or other bias (if any).
- 6. You may include your own opinions, experience or ideas on the subject, although they should not dominate your review.

Format of the Article Review

- 1. Typed or printed <u>only</u>; double-spaced with 1" margins all around.
- 2. About 3 pages long (2 minimum, 4 absolute maximum).
- 3. Stapled, but with NO cover page, binder, or folder.
- 4. Put short quotes in "quotation marks." Long quotes (more than 3 lines) should indented right and left and single-spaced, or else avoided altogether (paraphrase instead).
- 5. Citations are not necessary when you are referring to the article being reviewed. For other sources, use textnotes with a List of References at end [see **Sample** below].

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Evaluation

You will be graded on formatting, grammar, spelling, syntax, organization, and quality of coverage. You lose 1/2 of the points if you turn the review in late. Evidence of collaboration with other students costs you both all the points. So does plagiarism:

Trout, Robert R., "Lying Under Oath," American Journal of Political Ethics, April 2007, 32-39.

Trout addresses the issue of the economic costs of misinformation introduced into the public domain by the egregiously self-serving lies of politicians, bureaucrats, lawyers, and economics professors testifying in court or before Congress. Trout's paper can be contrasted with the earlier work of C. Foster, who justified the use of lies, damned lies and statistics by the need for good CAPE evaluations [Foster (2005)].
