Ethnic Studies 200C: Research in Ethnic Studies

Professor Yen Le Espiritu

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Course Description

This course will present students with project research designs, presented by Ethnic Studies faculty and affiliated faculty. Presenters will discuss how they conceive of and pose their research questions, integrate theoretical and methodological models that guide their research plan, how they think about the type and direction of the research undertaken, and how they conceptualize the end result in terms of presentation and reading audiences, publishing plans, and the larger conversations that the research will engage.
