HINE 116 The Middle East in the Age of European Empires (1798-1918)

This course is an introductory survey of the modern history of the Middle East from the end of the eighteenth century to the end of the imperial period and the prelude to nation-states. It examines political and socioeconomic change and thought in the late Ottoman Empire and Qajar Iran from the Napoleonic invasion of Egypt to World War I, the critical period when the seeds of the contemporary Middle East were planted. The striking growth of European economic, political, and cultural influence in the region and the Middle Eastern responses, including sustained efforts to re-structure social, political, and cultural institutions, will constitute the focus of the course. There is no prerequisite for HINE 116.
