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This course explores selected problems in the legal history of the United States from the period of the Great Rebellion (aka The Civil War) and Reconstruction to the present, with special emphasi upon public law (i.e., constitutional developments), and the role of the legal profession, courts, legislatures, executives, and regulatory bodies.
