COURSE DESCRIPTION. How did capitalism begin and how did it evolve in the US? Did a capitalist economy dampen or fuel class inequality across the nineteenth and twentieth centuries? And what is the role of the state in a capitalist system? In this class, we will discuss the basics of the history of capitalism and read core texts.

EXPECTATIONS. You are expected to come to class and to work a maximum of 1-2 hours outside of class per week.
