Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide an analytical introduction to the application of contemporary analytic political science to the understanding of historical and contemporary political issues. The course will focus on the four origins of the modern state, the conditions of the democratic stability and instability, and the political economy of modern democracies. There are no prerequisites and all are welcome.

Course grades are based on one take home midterm exam (worth 40% of the final grade) and one take home final exam (worth 60%). **Both exams must be submitted digitally via the Turnitin assignment link on TritonEd**. No hard copy will be required.
