'Ghetto Schools' in the Public Imagination

Course Description

This course examines the problematic label of the "ghetto" and its euphemisms ("urban", "inner city", etc.) that have been placed on poor, urban, largely minority communities, and the impact that such labeling has on schooling policies, pedagogy and outcomes. As a point of departure, we will begin with the archetype of the "ghetto school" in popular media, through a critical analysis of films, music, literature, and art.
