Course Objective:

This course is an introduction to financial accounting (assumes no prior knowledge of accounting) and plays the role of two prerequisites: first, for the Rady School of Management accounting minor and, second, for the management science major, specifically for Corporate Finance (Econ 173B). Thus, we will study basic book-keeping, principles of accrual accounting, plus financial reporting and financial analysis.

Guidance

Students will need the current <u>Reader & Course Workbook</u>. A number of websites provide tutorials and glossaries. The <u>course webpage</u> will provide contemporaneous guidance and support. Students should check it often, especially for announcements and instructions related to for class-preparation - documents to *print & bring-to-class*.

Grades

Grades will be based on accumulated scores using a 100 point weighted scale. Deliverables are assigned a *weight* with the sum of *weights* equal to 100%. Thus, *weighted scores* (regardless of points allotted to individual assignments) will fall between 0 and 100 points.

Letter grades will be based on a *curve* but with certain absolute attributions at the top and the bottom:

- ➤ Class average establishes the lowest B-.
- ➤ Any weighted score of 90.0 points or greater will be assigned an "A".
- ➤ All weighted score of 54.99 points or fewer will be assigned an "F".
- ➤ At least 62.0 weighted points will be needed for a "C-"or "P".

Details

<u>PowerPoint Presentation</u>: Students will be assigned a publicly-traded company and given a template of slides to adapt to their company presentation.

- ✓ No mistakes = 7 points; any mistake or error = 0 points.

<u>Quizzes</u>: For three-of-four quizzes, students will work in teams of two. Every student will turn-in a separate paper.

The Midterm exam on February 15th will be multiple-choice.

The <u>Final exam</u> on Monday March 19th will include multiple choice and problem-solving exercises.
