COURSE OBJECTIVE AND DISCRIPTION

The objective of this course is to develop visual language through learning the fundamentally academic, yet essentially needed skill of basic drawing. To reach this objective, we learn how to handle number of challenges/exercises to transfer three-dimensional information on to a two-dimensional surface. We need to understand the form, the shape, the positive and negative space, the fore, middle and background space, perspective, and the light source all without our preconceived idea. From this, we develop understanding in the grammar of the language. From this on, we will mainly focus on developing vocabulary, by performing number of exercises, specific with materials, format, and restricted content. For the final few weeks, we will explore even further to understand how to represent the subject/content.

EXPECTATION

Attendance

Students must attend <u>every class</u>. "Attendance is Mandatory," thus unexcused absence from class will negatively affect your grade. (Personal obligations or miss scheduling of your time are NOT excused absences.) If tardiness and not being prepared is habitual, it will count as a full absence as well. Come to class <u>on time</u> all prepared with materials and expected assignments. (Three counts of tardiness will be equal to one absence.)

Participation

Engagement and participation in the class discussion, activities and project critiques is expected from each and every one of students in the class.

Sketchbook

Sketchbook assignments will be given every week. Usually, the new sketchbook assignment will be given on Tuesday and due Tuesday in the following week.

When the assignment specifically requires you to complete <u>a certain number of sketches or researching studies</u>, you are required to fulfill that NUMBER. Otherwise, a certain deduction will be applied.

Expect to spend a considerable time outside of the class to keep up with the class load.

Remember, the more you exercise, the better you become.

Cell Phones and iPods

<u>Turn off all cell phones during the class.</u> Receiving, returning, or making calls and <u>texting</u> or browsing FB or tweeting during the class is PROHIBITED.

The use of iPods or other mp3 players are allowed from time to time during the work time.

Breaks

There will be 20 min break during the class. It will be plenty for making necessary calls, returning calls, or getting snacks. However, it will negatively affect your grade for taking extra long breaks and not coming back on time.

Attire

Expect to get dirty during the class. Don't wear anything nice or light color. Bring a smock, apron, or coverall for the class if necessary. This is very important. When you feel psychologically constricted because of your attire, it negatively affects your true creative motive.

"Clean Up"

Mandatory!!! Be sure to clean up after your work and after class.

Take the trash to the trashcan.

No pencil shaves left on the table.

If you see paper towels in the sink, remove it and put it in the trashcan.

Make sure all the tables and stools are neatly organized.

If I catch you NOT following the clean up guideline, it will affect your grade as well.

GRADING

I maintain an open-book grading policy. Please feel free to consult with me at any point during the quarter about how you are being evaluated on either individual projects or your over-all progress. I am available during the office hour or by appointment outside of office hour.

Everyone has 100 points to start out the quarter. With 100 points, you will earn a C. From each absence, lack of preparation, or insufficient homework, you will loose points accordingly. On the other hand, from strong participation, effort and work, you will earn points to further enhance your grade. So for example, if you come to class on time every time, turn in every home work, and finish your projects all at mediocre level, you will not loose or gain any points and receive a C.

Students are expected to work extensively both in class and outside of class to complete projects and assignments according to the guide lines by the due dates. Missed due dates, lectures, in class work time, critiques or any other class activities will impact a part of 60% of your grade.

Please remember:

An "A" will be given only to students who exceeded all the expectation and meet the guideline and demonstrated 110% or more in every aspect (understanding, risk taking, consistency, presentation, execution, effort and bravery to name a few) in every assignment or project.

So don't even think to expect an A just because you came to class every time and did every assignment or project. That is barely a C.

Keep in mind that "Attendance", "Engagement", and "Participation" are all very close family. They are NOT independently operating.
