Course Information

- As the first of the macroeconomic sequence, Econ 110A introduces students to macroeconomic modeling. It is designed to teach students how to apply models to understand current macroeconomic issues. We will cover short-run models of economic fluctuations, medium-run models of price flexibility, and long-run models of economic growth.

Required Book and Materials:

- Olivier Blanchard, *Macroeconomics*, 5th ed. The UCSD custom edition is fine. The Student Study Guide by David Findley is strongly recommended. Textbooks are available at the Bookstore and at the library on reserve.
- We will cover Cha. 1-13 for the course.

Recommended Readings:

- It is recommended that students get into the habit of browsing the daily newspapers like *The Wall Street Journal* or *The Financial Times*, or the weekly magazine *The Economist* at least a couple of times per month. This will provide some context for the course.

Practice Problems:

There is no graded homework. However, there are two sources of practice problems that you can make use of:

- Student Study Guide: Students who made intensive use of the study guide have been much happier with their grades than those who did not.
- Practice Problems: posted on TED.

There will be weekly review sessions led by teaching assistants (Monday 6:00-6:50pm and 7:00-7:50pm in CSB 001). **The first TA session will start in the week of Jan. 14th. It is highly recommended that you attend the review sessions regularly.** Due to limited class time, we cannot cover a lot of examples in regular class and therefore TAs will be able to offer more examples for difficult concepts in review sessions. In addition, **the problems covered by TA sessions are very likely to be on the exams.**
