- Course description:
 - As the first class in the micro sequence, Econ 100A is designed to teach you how to set up, solve and analyze optimization models and apply these mathematical models to the theory of the consumer (commodity demand, labor supply and consumption/savings decisions).
 Finally, we will examine the fundamentals of decision making under risk and uncertainty.
 - o Prerequisites: Econ 1 and one year of calculus (Math 10C, 20C, or 21C).

Grade composition

Your grade will be based on the best of two scores, computed as shown below under option 1 and option 2. (I will compute both and choose the highest one for you at the end of the quarter.)

Attendance

I will usually measure attendance by clicker answers. If you were present but forgot your clicker (or it malfunctioned, or you haven't bought it yet) you can still get attendance credit by coming over to tell me this right after class AND sending me an email with the subject "attendance Econ 100 on <date>". Having the electronic record makes it easy for me to correct your attendance score at the end of the quarter. If during a given class I do not ask any clicker questions or take attendance in some other obvious way, that lecture will simply not enter the score calculation (and I should not receive an email from you asking for attendance credit...)

Problem sets and quizzes:

There will be *weekly problem sets* posted by Monday on TritonEd. During your discussion section, your TA will work through these problems, and we will post the answer key on the following Monday. <u>You will not turn in these problem sets and they will not be graded.</u> However, it is extremely important that <u>you do them</u>. Solving problems is the only way to truly learn economics, and they will be a crucial component of studying well. They will also help you do well on quizzes:

Online quizzes will be available on TritonEd Sundays at 4pm, and can be taken anytime between 4pm and midnight. Once you start the quiz you will have one hour to complete it. Some of the questions will test your understanding of important concepts covered in lecture, and others will be similar to problems in that week's set, so that you are likely to get much higher scores if you have solved that week's homework.

Exam policies

• Exams are closed book and notes. A basic calculator is required (no graphing or calculus capabilities). There will be no bathroom breaks during mid-terms, and only between designated times during the final. If you arrive late, I will allow you to take the exam in the time that remains as long as no one has turned in an exam and left the room. Once a classmate has turned in an exam, you will earn a zero on the test if you arrive late.

- Regrade requests:
