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Course description: This is an introductory course on how the nervous system interacts with the environment. We will cover the basics of cellular organizations of the nervous system, how it processes sensory information, how it generates motor output and behaviors, and how one learns from experience. This class assumes little science background beyond high school biology and is recommended for non-science majors who are interested in the brain.
