**Goals:** In this class, we will focus on past and present scientific breakthroughs and the diversity of scientists that have pushed them forward. A major goal is to emphasize celebrate the fact that diversity plays a huge role in modern day scientific research.

### **Logistics and Requirements:**

We will approach science and diversity in multiple ways.

1) For many of the class periods, we will have <u>guest speakers</u>, primarily from the Biological Sciences department, <u>who will describe their path to science, their challenges</u>, and some of their research. This will be followed by a question and answer session and/or discussion with students participating in the discussion. (Depending on the speaker, students may be asked to read a review or short paper before coming to class so that everybody can participate in the discussion.) However, much of our discussion can be on the social or other challenges they faced. <u>Synchronous class presence is required for this; recorded lectures will not be provided.</u>

IMPORTANT: You are expected to participate in questions and discussion during and/or after the speaker's presentation

- 2) Each student will be required to turn in a 1-2 page on: (a) the personal background and (b) a short and interesting overview of the research progress of a diverse contributor to biological science. The writeup is due by March 4, i.e., the end of the 8<sup>th</sup> week of class. Areas and scientists of interest could, for example, include: (1) a key diverse contributor to the identification of the AIDs virus, Flossie Wong-Staal,(2) the prime discoverer of autophagy (or how cells rid themselves of aging components), Yoshinori Ohsumi, (3) a major diverse expert in the phage therapy pioneered to fight drug-resistant bacterial infections, Paul Turner, or (4) one of the visionaries of RNA vaccine technology used to fight COVID-19. We will have a signup sheet later in the quarter so people don't overlap on topics.
- 3) I am at present signing up outside speakers. In addition to the 5-6 outside speakers, I will give lectures on careers and related manners.
- 4) I may at times send out links to videos or podcasts that inspire me.

#### **Remote Instruction:**

This particular Bio194/Bio281 course is designated Remote for the whole quarter.

#### **Course Objectives:**

UCSD is very diverse, as is San Diego, California, and the U.S. itself. The main objective of this course is to reveal just how diverse science has been and is today -- so that we all realize that we are not "other", not "imposters", but the essential and amazing keys to the future of science, health, and survival.

## **Grading Policy:**

No midterm and no final exams.

Attendance at each lecture will count as 5% (5% x 10 lectures = 50% total).

Grades will be determined by: (a) attendance (50%), (b) participation in discussion, including asking questions during and after the presentation each week (25%), and (c) a one-two page writeup on a diverse scientist of your choice, submitted by March 5, the end of week 8 (25%).

A: 90% or higher

B: 70-89% C: 50-69%

#### **Course Policies**

Classroom conduct: While all the course materials will be offered on-line rather than in the classroom setting, general policies remain the same. Please refrain from all unnecessary use of electronics, side
